The fourth grade students visited the Mining and Rollo Jamison Museums to learn about the past. Students toured a lead mine and learned about the mining process. They also saw many artifacts from the past century and discovered how they were used.













May 1, 2024—With speech and language disorders ranking among the most common disabilities that affect children, families are encouraged to learn the signs of these disorders and to seek an evaluation if they have concerns. It's a timely message that speech-language pathologists are sharing for May, which is recognized as National Speech-Language-Hearing Month.

A child's ability to communicate effectively is critical to their learning, future reading and writing success, academic performance, social interactions, and even their behavior. Speech and language disorders are generally treatable, and even reversible or preventable in some cases with early intervention. Unfortunately, many parents who have concerns are told to "wait and see" if their child's difficulties resolve on their own-often by well-meaning friends, family members, and sometimes even professionals. This can result in delayed treatment outside of the optimal time window for intervention, which is between birth and 3 years. During these years 80% of a child's brain development occurs.

Speech and language disorders are evaluated and treated by speech-language pathologists. *Speech* is the ability to produce speech sounds using the mouth, lips, and tongue. A child may make mistakes with sounds in words, repeat sounds and words, or be difficult to understand. *Language* is the ability to use and put words together— and to understand others' words.

Parents can use these tips to encourage a child's communication development at home:

- Talk about what you're doing, what your child is doing, and what your child sees. Use longer sentences as your child grows older.
- Communicate with your child in the languages that you are most comfortable using.
- Use a lot of different words with your child. Don't worry about using big words. Children enjoy new and unusual words.
- Help your child listen. Give directions for your child to follow.
- Tell stories to your child a lot. Read to your child in the languages they are learning.
- Don't interrupt your child to correct their speech sounds. It's okay if your child makes some mistakes with sounds. Say the sound correctly when you talk.
- Set limits for screen time. Use that time for talking, reading, and playing together.

Families can familiarize themselves with <u>communication milestones</u>, which are the skills that most children achieve within particular age ranges, from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA). These milestones are for children between birth and 5 years. Children may not meet every milestone listed within their age range. However, if a child is missing several skills in an age range, then families may want to seek an evaluation.



May/June Newsletter Notes from the Nurse

IMMUNIZATION REMINDER:

It's hard to believe, but we will soon be registering students for the 2024-25 school year! The Wisconsin Student Immunization Law requires students to be immunized for disease prevention. Please reach out if you have any questions or if you are interested in a waiver for vaccinations.



For the 2024-2025 school year, the following minimum requirements must be met, or a waiver must be submitted.

For pre-K students (ages 2 to 4 years):

- 4 doses of DTaP/DTP/DT
- 3 doses of Polio
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B
- 1 dose of MMR
- 1 dose of Varicella

For students in kindergarten through 6th grades (and age 5):

- 4 doses of DTaP/DTP/DT
- 4 doses of Polio
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B
- 2 doses of MMR
- 2 doses of Varicella

For students in 7th through 12th grades:

- 4 doses of DTaP/DTP/DT
- 1 dose of Tdap (changed from 6th grade to 7th grade to ensure children are 11 years old at time of vaccination)
- 4 doses of Polio
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B
- 2 doses of MMR
- 2 doses of Varicella

Children 5 years of age or older who are enrolled in a Pre-K class should be assessed using the immunization requirements for Kindergarten through Grade 6, which would normally correspond to the individual's age.

D = diphtheria, T = tetanus, P = pertussis vaccine. DTaP/DTP/DT/Td vaccine for all students Pre-K through 12 Four doses are required. However, if a student received the 3rd dose after the 4th birthday, further doses are not required. **Note**: A dose four days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable.

DTaP/DTP/DT vaccine for children entering Kindergarten: Each student must have received one dose after the 4th birthday (either the 3rd, 4th, or 5th dose) to be compliant. **Note**: a dose four days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable.

Tdap is an adolescent tetanus, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis combination vaccine. If a student received a dose of a tetanuscontaining vaccine, such as Td, within five years before entering the grade in which Tdap is required, the student is compliant and a dose of Tdap vaccine is not required.

Polio vaccine for students entering grades Kindergarten through 12. Four doses are required. However, if a student received the 3rd dose after the 4th birthday, further doses are not required. **Note**: a dose four days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable.

Laboratory evidence of immunity to hepatitis B is also acceptable.

MMR is measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine. The first dose of MMR vaccine must have been received on or after the 1st birthday. Laboratory evidence of immunity to all three diseases (measles and mumps and rubella) is also acceptable. **Note**: A dose four days or less before the 1st birthday is also acceptable.

Varicella vaccine is chickenpox vaccine. Students with a reliable history of varicella disease are not required to receive the Varicella vaccine. A parent or guardian may indicate that their student has had chickenpox on the Student Immunization Record form (F-04020L).



The Wisconsin Student Immunization Law requires students to be immunized for disease prevention. Be sure to get your child vaccinated this summer if they have not received the recommended vaccinations for their upcoming grade level. Most students moving from 4K to 5K will need vaccinations (if they have not already received their 4-year-old shots). Students in 6th grade will need the Tdap before entering 7th grade, unless they have already received it. Tdap reminder letters were mailed just prior to spring break and the Tdap was offered at school the week after spring

break. If your child receives a vaccination outside of school, it is your responsibility to notify the school nurse in writing. By law and district policy, the school is required to enforce vaccination compliance. Thus, legal notices will be sent to parents and guardians of non-compliant students next fall. Depending on the previous year's vaccination compliance, our district may be required or may choose to exclude non-compliance students from school in the fall. This means that non-compliant students who don't have waivers on file will be sent home from school at the exclusion deadline. Grant County Health Department does not always provide immunizations to children/adults who have private health insurance that covers the vaccine(s), including insurances with a deductible or co-pay. Vaccinations for privately insured individuals with coverage may need to be provided through your medical provider. This does not affect children with Medical Assistance and BadgerCare, or uninsured adults. To inquire about vaccination availability for your child/student, call Grant County Health Department at 608-723-6416. You may contact the school nurse for a medical, religious, or personal conviction waiver if you choose not to immunize your child/student. Note that medical waivers also require a health care practitioner's signature.

5th GRADE BLOOD PRESSURE VISITS:

On March 13th, April 3rd, and April 8th, Mrs. Brinkman (school nurse) and Rowan (UW-Madison nursing student) visited 5th grade classrooms to talk with students about the effects of risk factors and lifestyle choices on blood pressure.

If you want a copy of your immunizations from the school, contact the school nurse or health paraprofessional. If you did not take advantage of the on-site vaccination clinic provided by Grant County Health Department in April but would still like your child to receive vaccinations such as HPV or meningitis, please contact your child's health care provider or Grant County Health Department at (608) 723-6416.

AED (AUTOMATIC EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR) UPDATE:

Our alignment with Project ADAM and Children's Hospital of Wisconsin has provided guidance and resources for implementation of the AED program. We have three AEDs in our middle/high school building (one stationary and two portable), and one in our main elementary building. Mrs. Brinkman held emergency one AED drill at the elementary (on April 15th) and two AED drills at the middle/high school (on February 21th and



March 18th). We currently hold "heart safe school" status through Project ADAM. Our Medical Advisor, Dr. Colleen McCurry, acts as our AED oversight provider to guide our emergency response to incidents in the district. Each fall, Mrs. Brinkman sends the AED procedure to our staff members and reviews it during staff training. As the school nurse, Mrs. Brinkman serves as the program coordinator for our public access defibrillator program. As a CPR instructor, she provides training for school staff members. She maintains her certification through American Heart Association (AHA) and our training site provider is Southwest Technical College (SWTC) in Fennimore, WI. We maintain an "exchange of services" contract with Southwest Wisconsin Technical

College, Fennimore, which allows us to use their equipment for a fee and to access the AHA program. Mrs. Brinkman provided CPR in Schools training to the 8th grade health classes this year and will train staff on June 3rd and 4th in Heartsaver First Aid, CPR, and AED use. After a training date, the training roster is updated and emailed to school staff so they are aware of who is currently certified. We have had no cardiac events this school year.

HEALTH ADVISORY - INCREASE IN INVASIVE SEROGROUP Y MENINGOCOCCAL DISEASE IN THE UNITED STATES:



Notice: Increase in Invasive Serogroup Y Meningococcal Disease in the United States

The most common symptoms include:

- Fever
- Headache
- Stiff neck

There are often additional symptoms, such as

- Nausea
- Vomiting
- Photophobia (eyes being more sensitive to light)
- Altered mental status (confusion)

Complications

Even with antibiotic treatment, 10 to 15 in 100 people with meningococcal disease will die. Up to 1 in 5 survivors will have long-term disabilities, such

- Loss of limb(s)
- Deafness
- Nervous system problems
- Brain damage

Disease comes on suddenly, without warning, and can quickly become life-threatening.

Meningococcal vaccines are safe and effective. All 11-12 year-olds should receive a

MenACWY vaccine. Since protection wanes, CDC recommends a booster dose at age 16 years.

Meningitis is an inflammation (swelling) of the protective membranes covering the brain and spinal cord. A bacterial or viral infection of the fluid surrounding the brain and spinal cord usually causes the swelling. Injuries, cancer, certain drugs, and other types of infections also can cause meningitis. It is important to know the specific cause of meningitis because the treatment differs depending on the cause.

Where Can I Find These Vaccines?

Your doctor is usually the best place to receive recommended vaccines for you or your child. These vaccines are part of the routine childhood immunization schedule. Therefore, vaccines for children and teens are regularly available at pediatric and family practice offices, community or public health clinics, and public health departments.

Sixth Grade Science Lab



On April 22nd, Boscobel students traveled to the SWAL Mathematics competition. This year, Darlington High School was the host. Sixty eight middle school students from the seven schools in our athletic conference competed for medals. Students competed in 4 rounds of math questions consisting of a variety of application and word problems covering the areas of algebra, geometry, statistics, and probability. Scores are compiled after each round, and then they are added to determine the top math students for the event.

On April 12th, the middle school students participated in the Feed My Starving Children mobile pack in Boscobel. The students had a great experience packing meals for those in need of food in many countries around the world. Feed My Starving Children is a non-profit organization that believes many deaths of children can be prevented by simply providing meals to those who have very little to eat. Volunteers come to the mobile packing sites and prepare the meal packets by adding soy, vitamins and dehydrated veggies to the rice. During the two packing shifts attended by the middle school students, over 74,000 meals were packed. This is enough food to feed over 200 children for a full year.
